Week 110 Esther Saves God's People

Scriptures: Esther 3 - 8

Key Verse: Esther 4:14 "If you remain silent at this time, relief and deliverance will arise for the Jews from another place, but you and your father's house will perish. Yet who knows whether you have come to the kingdom for such a time as this?

Key Points:

1. Haman receives promotions, and is angered when Mordecai does not bow down to him. Instead of punishing only Mordecai, Haman decides to seek his revenge by destroying all of the Jews in the kingdom. He persuades King Ahasuereus to let him write a decree that the Jews may be destroyed.

2. When Mordecai learns of the decree, he mourns in the midst of the city, and word of it reaches Esther. She discovers the reason for Mordecai's grief and learns of the decree of the king, but does not want to go into the kings' presence, since she has not been summoned. Mordecai reminds her that she, too, will be killed. Esther asks for all the Jews to fast for her before she goes into the king.

3. Esther seeks an audience with the king, and when she is accepted, she requests that the king and Haman come that day to a banquet she has prepared. When they come, she requests that they attend another banquet tomorrow, where she will reveal her petition. Haman leaves joyful, but is angered when he sees Mordecai. He goes home to his wife and friends, who suggest that he have Mordecai hanged on a gallows. Haman has the gallows made.

4. Meanwhile, the king is unable to sleep, and he has his book of chronicles read for him, when he remembers that he needs to honor Mordecai. He asks Haman for his advice on what should be done for the man the king delights to honor. Haman, thinking the king is talking about him, suggests a great honor of riding through the city on horseback, with someone shouting about him. The king is pleased by this suggestion, and tells Haman to do so for Mordecai.

5. At the banquet, Queen Esther asks that the king to save the lives of her and her people, and tells him that Haman devised the wicked plan. The king leaves in his anger, and when he returns, Haman is begging for his life before Esther, laying across her couch. Haman is then hanged on the gallows prepared for Mordecai.

6. King Ahasuerus gives Mordecai the house of Haman, and the king wrote a counter-decree to save the Jews. Instead of just being attacked, they may now fight back against their enemies. Many people in the land were converted to Judaism.

Esther knew the king would talk to her because he held out his scepter when she came into the room. The scepter was a symbol of his authority over all the people.




Purim (Hebrew: פורים *Pûrîm* "lots", related to Akkadian *pūru*) is a Jewish holiday that commemorates the deliverance of the Jewish people of the ancient Persian Empire from Haman's plot to annihilate them, as recorded in/ the Biblical Book of Esther (*Megillat Esther*). According to the story, Haman cast lots to determine the day upon which to exterminate the Jews.


Purim is celebrated annually according to the Hebrew calendar on the 14th day of the Hebrew month of Adar, the day following the victory of the Jews over their enemies; as with all Jewish holidays, Purim begins at sundown on the previous secular day. In cities that were protected by a surrounding wall at the time of Joshua, including Shushan (Susa) and Jerusalem, Purim is celebrated on the 15th of the month, known as *Shushan Purim*. Purim is characterized by public recitation of the Book of Esther (*keriat ha-megilla*), giving mutual gifts of food and drink (*mishloach manot*), giving charity to the poor (*mattanot la-evyonim*), and a celebratory meal (*se'udat Purim*);^[1] other customs include drinking wine, wearing of masks and costumes, and public celebration.

Jewish exiles from the Kingdom of Judah who had been living in the Babylonian captivity (6th Century BCE) found themselves under Persian rule after Babylonia was in turn conquered by the Persian Empire. According to the Book of Esther, Haman, royal vizier to King Ahasuerus / Xerxes,^[2] planned to kill the Jews, but his plans were foiled by Esther, who was made queen after Xerxes kicked out his previous queen, Vashti, and Mordechai, the palace gatekeeper for Xerxes who raised Esther when her parents died, though he was her cousin. The Jews were delivered from being the victims of an evil decree against them and were instead allowed by the King to destroy their enemies, and the day after the battle was designated as a day of feasting and rejoicing.

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
