Paul is Shipwrecked

Scriptures: Acts 27

Key Verse: Acts 27:23, 24

"For there stood by me this night an angel of the God to whom I belong and whom I serve, saying, 'Do not be afraid, Paul; you must be brought before Caesar; and indeed God has granted you all those who sail with you."

Key Points:

- 1. Paul sent sail to Rome under guard along with several other prisoners. At their first stop at Myra, Paul was allowed to go to friends there who ministered to him.
- 2. Setting sail again on another ship, they sailed slowly for many days. The weather became very difficult and dangerous. They came to the harbor of Fair Havens and rested there. After days of fasting, Paul advised them that disaster would come to them with much loss to the cargo if they went on, but they did not listen to him. They set sail again, not wanting to spend the winter there.
- **3**. The weather again became very dangerous and the ship was difficult to manage. For fear of running aground, they had to lighten the ship by throwing the tackle overboard.
- 4. The ship was caught by a ferocious storm and there was no sight of sun or stars for many days. The crew gave up hope that they would be saved, but Paul spoke to them again, telling them that an angel appeared to him, promising him he would make it to Rome and appear before Caesar.
- 5. Coming close to land they dropped anchors fearing the ship would be broken up by the rocks. The sailors planned to escape from the ship but Paul warned them unless they stayed on the ship they would not be saved.
- 6. On day fourteen, Paul urges the soldiers to eat for they had not eaten. He promises them that not a hair on their head would be harmed. They ate and when morning came the ship ran aground. The soldiers planned to kill all the prisoners before they escape. But the centurion wanted to save Paul's life and he kept them from carrying out their plan. Everyone reached land safely.



 - O What does his transformation say to us?

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
They had to endure many hardships. Paul was shipwrecked on Malta during one of his missionary journeys.


Paul Suffers for Christ Acts 27.

Shipwrecked!

Paul was a prisoner on a ship going to Rome. He was going to be judged by Caesar, the top man in the Roman government. Paul told the ship captain that he should not sail because it was the time of year for storms, but the captain did not listen to him. Sure enough, the ship got caught in a terrible storm. All 276 people on the ship thought they were going to die. But an angel of the Lord came to Paul in a dream and gave him a message for all the sailors and prisoners on the ship.




The children can place Paul aboard and carry this ship home to retell the story.
