- 5. On day 2, what separated the waters from the waters? Discuss what all must have been created in the "firmament".
- 6. When do we first read God seeing something was good? (v. 10) What has been created by this point? Does this happen on each subsequent day of creation?
- 7. Do you think it's interesting that God first created plants & trees, and then set lights in the sky? What light nourished the plants & trees the day they were created?
- 8. In 1:14-18, what other purposes are stated for the creation of greater & lesser lights?
- 9. How does God bless the sea creatures and birds of the air?
- 10. Give some examples of the different creature "kinds" of each living thing mentioned in v. 24-25: what are some beasts of the earth? Cattle? Creeping thing?
- 11. What unique distinctions are given to man when he is created? How are we unlike animals, according to this passage? (1:26-28)
- 12. In v. 29-31, are any animals actively carnivorous on day 6 of creation?
- 13. Discuss what it means that God "sanctified" the seventh day, and blessed it.
- 14. Why do you think it's important to state, in Jn 1:3, "without Him nothing was made that was made"?

Week 2: God Makes Man; the Garden of Eden

Discuss

- 2. In v. 2-4, what person witnessed these events? How, then, did the writer of Genesis know what to write, and why do you think it's important for us to understand this history?
- 3. What geography of the garden of Eden did you read about here? What land and water features are we told?
- 4. Compare the creation of Adam to the creation of land animals in 1:24-27. What verbs are used? What materials?
- 5. At what point did Adam become living? Who gave him life?
- 6. Discuss Adam's jobs: what tasks occupied his days? (v. 15, 19) What rules do we know God set forth for him? What other guidance do you think God gave to Adam?
- 7. Explain what usefulness there may have been in having Adam name all the animals by pairs. What did Adam realize was missing? What does "comparable" mean?
- 8. Describe why Eve was "comparable" to Adam in a manner unlike any other animal. How was she created differently by God than Adam?
- 9. How does Adam react to Eve, when God presents her to him? How does he see her as similar to, but different from, himself? In what ways does Adam praise God in his words about her?

Closer Study

Consider the idea of "one flesh" and its importance to our understanding of God, his creation of man, and how God would have us to live. How were Adam & Eve one flesh in "kind", like the animal pairs Adam named? In what ways does Adam accept & treasure Eve? Why is leaving parents important to being joined together as one flesh- important enough to be mentioned here? Can "becom[ing] one flesh" be a fixed event *and* a process?

- 5. What does the woman do before eating the fruit? Why do you think these details are included for us to read?
- 6. What did Adam do when the woman gave him the fruit? Did he know it was wrong?
- 7. Describe the phrase "their eyes were opened"- what does it mean? Look back at verse 5, and consider how the serpent deceived the woman.
- 8. What new problem did the man and woman have after eating the fruit? How did they attempt to solve it without God?
- 9. Why do you think the man and woman each blamed someone else for their sin?
- 10. Make a list of the consequences that resulted from eating the fruit.
- 11. What sacrifice was made to cover the man and woman's sin? (v. 21)
- 12. Why are Adam and Eve sent out of the garden of Eden? How did God protect it?

Closer Study

We are introduced to the concept of the tree of life. Where else in the Bible is this tree referenced? What other concepts ("a tree of life") help us understand its significance? (Re 22; Pr 3:18; others)

- 8. How many days were there between God's commandment to enter the ark and when the rain started?
- 9. Discuss the sources of the water that covered the earth. (7:10-12) How much water was therehow high was it? (v. 17-20)
- 10. Why do you think it would be important that God shut the door of the ark, not Noah or another person?
- How many people did God save on the ark? Discuss the faith demonstrated by these 8 people. Who would they have left behind? Why was it so unbelievable a flood was imminent to man at this time? (see Genesis 2:5)
- 12. Look up other passages in the New Testament where Noah is mentioned. What else can you learn about this righteous man? (Mt 24:37-38; He 11;7; I Pe3:20; II Pe 2:5)

- 8. Make a list of the commands Noah and his family are given, and compare it to what they would have known before the flood. Is any of the information new to them, do you think? (9:1-7)
- 9. Describe the covenant God makes with Noah, and the symbol God set. Do we still see evidence of this covenant? Is it still in effect today?
- 10. Consider Noah's actions as a farmer. At what point were his actions sinful? How do we know?
- 11. Why was it so important for Noah's sons to cover his nakedness? What should Ham have done, so as not to sin and be cursed for his actions?
- 12. How are we shown God's attitude towards seeing one another's nakedness? How did Shem and Japheth avoid sinning, and what can we learn from this example?

- 9. Do you think this was the first time Sarah had heard this promise? What other efforts had she pursued to "help" God fulfill this promise?
- 10. What else do we learn about the covenant between the Lord and Abraham in 18:17-19?
- 11. Could Abraham have jeopardized the covenant by knowing what the Lord planned to do to Sodom? If yes, how so?
- 12. What commendable character trait do we observe here in Abraham as he bargains for the saving of the city? (who lives in Sodom??) Does God seem pleased by this? Give evidence.

- 6. Discuss these five facts and speculate if and how they relate: (1) in 18:2 three men appeared to Abraham; (2) in 18:22 the men left for Sodom and (3) Abraham still stood before the Lord; (4) in 18:33 the Lord left Abraham and went his way; (5) in 19:1, two angels arrived at Sodom (KJV).
- 7. Who was Lot and how did he get to Sodom? Was he special to anyone in chapters 18 or 19? How did he greet the angels and what did he recommend they do? Why?
- 8. What did the angels learn about Sodom during their visit? Discuss God's view of the sin in Sodom and if He still holds that same view today.
- 9. Describe the punishment the two towns received and how it would have looked from a safe distance.
- 10. List those that escaped the punishment.
- 11. How did Lot's wife die after safely leaving town? Why do you think she looked back? What lessons do we learn from her actions?
- 12. For the adults: Discuss how Lot's daughters' actions at the end of chapter 19 later affect the Children of Israel.

- 6. Describe the elements of this passover related to the people needing to leave in a hurry. What's the problem with leaven? Leaving leftovers of the lamb? Why did they need to watch? (12:42)
- 7. Why do you think the people of Israel were not to leave their houses, painted with blood on the doorposts, the night of the Passover until the morning?
- 8. How many Egyptian households were impacted by this last plague?
- 9. This may be the first instance, in 11:6, where the children of Israel were called a "congregation". How many people, do you think, were part of this group? (12:37-38)
- 10. Who was to eat this passover meal? If a stranger was present, how could he be included?
- 11. What is a memorial? In our vernacular the word is typically used in connection with a death: is this memorial associated with death as well? Explain.
- 12. What do we learn about the Philistines in chapter 13? Can you remember any upcoming events where the children of Israel interact with the Philistines?

- 8. How Esau was related to Jacob, the father of the C of I? Were Jacob and Esau friendly when they last met?
- 9. Genesis 36 seems to indicate that Amalek was a direct descendant of Esau. So why is Amalek coming to fight the C of I in verse 8?
- 10. Who did Moses choose to lead the C of I into battle with Amalek? Why did Moses choose him?
- 11. What determined which side was winning the battle? Was this a typical battle tactic of war during that time?
- 12. What was in Moses' hands during the battle? Explain the history of the item(s).
- 13. Was there a lesson to be learned by the victor of the battle?
- 14. How long can you hold your arm straight up with a Bible in your hand? Use a small Bible.

These discussion questions are meant for the whole family. The kids covered this chapter in class this morning, so hopefully there will be some familiarity. Please read the passage together then discuss the questions. Adapt the questions for younger and older participants as needed.

Discuss:

- 1. In Joshua 5:13, who was the man with the sword that stood opposite Joshua? Why was he there and what power did he represent? What makes a place holy?
- 2. The 'Lord' is quoted in 6:2. Does that relate back to 5:13? Why would the Lord say 'Jericho is given into your hand' and the battle had not yet begun? Do you think Joshua believed the Lord?
- 3. Beginning in 6:3, note how many times the number 7 is used. Can you think of other times in the Bible that 7 is used? Consider Genesis 1 & 2, Gen 7:2, 2 Kings 5:9, Matt 18:21, and many more. Discuss how the number seven may represent completion or perfection in theBible.
- 4. During the first six days the Children of Israel marched around Jericho, what was to be said or shouted by the Israelites? What sounds were commanded? Can you think of a reason this approach was used?
- 5. How was the seventh day of marching different from the prior six?
- 6. What caused the walls of Jericho to fall; marching, shouting, trumpets, weak concrete? Consider 6:17 when devising your answer. Does the Bible indicate what direction the walls fell; in, out?
- 7. 6:17 also mentions citizens of Jericho that were to be spared. Who were they and why were they treated differently?
- 8. What does 'consecrated' mean as used in 6:19? What was consecrated and why? Were these things used later in the scriptures?
- 9. Read and discuss 6:26. Why are 'firstborn' and 'youngest' mentioned?
- 10. In 7:1, it sounds like someone did something wrong, but the first sentence says 'the children of Israel committed a trespass' and the Lord burned against them. What was done and why was God upset with all the tribes of Israel? What was the result of the Lord's anger?
- 11. What was Joshua's plan to conquer the city of Ai? Why did he take that approach and were his plans successful? Why or why not?
- 12. In chapter 8 the second battle with Ai ended differently. Who won and why?

- 4. Pretend Gideon is your uncle. What is he doing for your family, and where is he doing it?
- 5. Where else have we read about terebinth trees? How were they used? (Ge 13:18; 18:1; 35:4; 35:8; Deut 11:30; Josh 19:33; Ju 4:11)
- 6. How does Gideon respond to being called a "mighty man of valor"?
- 7. After asking for a sign, what else does Gideon do? Can you remember someone else who, when approached by an angel, offered a sacrifice of a goat? (Ge 18)
- 8. In v. 22, why was Gideon afraid? What things had he been taught about seeing God face to face that'd make him scared for his life? (Ex 33:20)
- 9. Explain why Gideon feared for his life (and rightly so) when God instructed him to tear down the altar of Baal and the wooden image beside it. How do you think the children of Israel were using these to deal with their problems with the Midianites & Amalekites?
- 10. Consider Joash's answer to the people in v. 31, and discuss how important Joash's faith must have been in developing Gideon into a mighty man of valor for the Lord.

- 3. Contrast the army chosen by Saul and the army of Philistines. How did the Israelites react to the Philistines?
- 4. Why was Samuel qualified to make the sacrifices, and Saul was not?
- 5. Did Saul have justification for his actions, from an earthly standpoint? What about from a Godly perspective- based on Samuel's words to him, how was God testing Saul's faith?
- 6. Discuss what other problems could also arise from a new king usurping the functions of a priest. How are the two roles different?
- 7. Make an educated guess about who may be referenced in verse 14, and explain why you think so.
- 8. How many soldiers had Saul lost from the beginning of the chapter until now? Review how large of an army of Philistines the Israelites are facing.
- 9. How is the lack of a blacksmith a crippling thing for a nation facing war at this time?
- 10. Thinking militarily, what advantages do the Philistines have over Israel? Compare the position of the Israelites with other battles where they were gravely outmatched (Gideon, Joshua, etc): what is God teaching the children of Israel?

Read: | Samuel 15

Discuss:

- 1. Who are the Kenites? (Jud 1:16) Why does Saul tell them to depart from Amalek?
- 2. Who are the Amalekites? Where have they crossed paths with the children of Israel before? (Ex 17, Deut 25:18;
- 3. Consider v. 1-3: How does God's command in v. 1 help shape the proper perception of the command Saul receives to utterly destroy all of Amalek?
- 4. In your opinion, do you think Saul was a competent military leader of the Israelites? Where do you see evidence of his success in the chapter?
- 5. Contrast Moses's role interceding for the people in Exodus 32 with Samuel's actions in v. 11: is he interceding for the king? How is his role different, as a prophet to an earthly king?
- 6. Explain Saul's response to Samuel's condemnation of his actions in v. 13-22: how does Saul perceive his actions with the Amalekites?
- 7. In v. 23, Samuel compares rebellion to the sin of divination. Besides their sinful nature, discuss how rebellion/ presumption could be similar in motivation to divination/ idolatry.
- 8. What do we learn about the nature of God, the Glory (or Strength) of Israel, in this exchange between Samuel and Saul? Do we find this name for the Lord anywhere else?
- 9. Saul asks Samuel to return with him so he may bow before the Lord in both v. 26 vs v. 30, yet Samuel only says "yes" the second time. Why? How was the second request different?
- 10.Look at at least 3 different translations of this chapter*, paying close attention to v. 10, v. 29, and v. 35. What *is* the difference between God regretting having chosen Saul as king, and the Strength of Israel not lying/ repenting/ relenting/ changing his mind as a man would?

Discuss:

- 1. Consider the relationship between Saul and Samuel, from ch. 15 into ch. 16: why is Samuel mourning? What is Saul's relationship with Samuel now? What does Sameul fear?
- 2. How does Samuel act in faith in v. 2-3? What other time was he called to obey the Lord over showing obedience to an authority figure?
- 3. Who else lived in Bethlehem, who we've studied recently? What's the connection between these residents of Bethlehem?
- 4. Who is Jesse's youngest son? Can you remember any other people you've met in the Bible who were the youngest child, yet led their family?
- 5. Discuss God's use of perspective in this passage: from whose perspective is the account told to us? Why is it important for us to know his thoughts?
- 6. Imagine you are Jesse, and give an account of this important event from your perspective. What do you know? What do you not know/ have not been told?
- 7. What information do we gain about David from the servant of Saul in v. 18 & 19? What of these qualities would Saul have appreciated, based on what you know of Saul as king?
- 8. In verse 19, what do we learn about David's actions after he was anointed by Samuel?
- 9. How does David become a trusted member of Saul's court? Do you think Saul knew at this time that David had been anointed by Samuel? Explain why or why not.
- 10. Make a quick list detailing what you know about this distressing spirit that terrified/ tormented Saul, as indicated in the chapter. How do you think this impacted Saul's ability to carry out his duties as king?

- 4. How are we told about David's popularity with all the people of Israel? How was it handled by David? By Saul?
- 5. Explain David's response to Saul attempting to pin him to the wall with a spear- why did it happen more than once?
- 6. Saul shows his faith in attempting to marry David to one of his daughters. Where does he place his faith: in the armies of the Philistines or in the will of the Lord?
- 7. How does Jonathan play a large role in saving David's life, when Saul and his servants plan David's murder?
- 8. Describe how David flees the palace. Do you remember another instance of misdirection with goat's hair?
- 9. How long has Ramah been Samuel's home, and why does David flee there? (I Samuel 1:19; 7:17) What other men of God are there when Saul's messengers arrive?
- 10. Compare and contrast Saul's confirmation as king of Israel with the account here in 19:19-24. How is Saul humbled?

- 2. How was David's visit to the tabernacle different from any visit he'd made in the past? Who would have been with him in previous visits while he lived at home? When he lived in the palace?
- 3. Read Mark 2:26-28. Viewing this event through the eyes of Jesus, what do we learn about David's actions- what about the interaction did God find acceptable?
- 4. Explain the people's reaction to David when he went to the cave of Adullam, and discuss how the people's behavior showed how they viewed David.
- 5. Why did David not remain in the stronghold of Moab?
- 6. Based on his words in 22:7-8, how does Saul's viewpoint stray from the truth? What does he say that's true?
- 7. Contrast Saul's behavior in 1 Samuel 15 to his wicked decree here against Ahimelek and all of Nob. To whose cause is Saul truly devoted?
- 8. Describe the relationship between David and Ahimelek.
- 9. What was Saul's main function as the king of Israel, as told to Samuel in I Sa 9:16? Do you observe him fulfilling that function in chapter 23? Who is now fulfilling that function?
- 10. In considering all David has been through in the last 3 chapters, in what ways do we observe David walking by faith/ trusting God? What would it have looked like if David had not believed God would one day allow him to rule Israel?
- 11. Take a look at the map on the back of this page and track David and Saul's movements, as Saul pursues David until called to fight the Philistines in 23:28-29.



DINNER DISCUSSIONS Week 75: Saul Visits the Witch of Endor

Read: | Samuel 28, | Sa 31

Discuss:

- 1. Review I Samuel 21: 10-15: Who is Achish? Look carefully at David's wording: why did he stop short of agreeing to fight against Israel? Why would that have been against God's will for David?
- 2. Consider how God had spoken to Saul in the past: in what ways did Saul attempt to hear from God? What has Saul done/ in what state is his heart that God will not speak to him?
- 3. What is a medium/ necromancer, and what information is Saul seeking from this person? What do you think Saul is wanting to hear from God? Should Saul have expected anything different than what he heard?
- 4. Why was this experience likely unique from all other "readings" this medium had done before? Look at her reaction to seeing Samuel and explain why she reacted as she did.
- 5. How did Saul behave once he heard God's voice through Samuel? What would have been better actions for him to take, knowing he was going to die the next day?
- 6. Though tragic, how did the death of three of Saul's sons clear the way for David to sit on the throne of Israel?
- 7. Discuss Saul's death: what could Saul have done differently? Where did he ultimately place his trust to save himself from the tortures of the Philistines?
- 8. Recall what you know of the Philistines and their treatment of Israel: what kind of nation are they? How do they treat those they conquer? (Judges 10, 13, 15, 16; I Samuel 4, 5, 7, 9:16; ch. 13, 17)
- 9. For how long did Saul reign over Israel? (I Sa 13:1) Compare those people who rejected God as their king and asked Samuel for an earthly king to those who walked in the desert with Moses for 40 years. What does rejection of God always inevitably yield, and how is Israel faring as a nation at the end of chapter 31?
- 10. What's the history of the city of Jabesh Gilead and king Saul? (1 Samuel 11) What did the valiant men do to honor their king?

Discuss:

- 1. Consider David chose to proceed after hearing of Saul's death: is he asking God's blessing on his plans, or seeking God's plans for his next steps? Discuss the difference.
- 2. Where is Michal, David's wife, the daughter of Saul? (1 Sa 25:44) Why would Saul have considered this a move to protect himself and his lineage from David taking over the throne?
- 3. What do you remember about the men of Jabesh- Gilead? Explain how David's response to them showed his respect for Saul, even after death.
- 4. Do a little research about the two military leaders in Israel- who led Saul's contingent after he died, and who was he? (see also 1 Samuel 14:50) Who seems to be the commander of David's army, and what was his relationship to David? (1 Chr 2:16)
- 5. Explain what the anointing by the tribe of Judah meant for David: over whom did they anoint him?
- 6. In what kind of fighting did Abner and Joab's men engage? Look at a few different translations of 2 Samuel 3:16: what type of weapon do you think these men used?
- 7. What was Asahel's intent in chasing Abner? How did Abner attempt to NOT fight him, and what reasons does he give for not wanting to fight?
- 8. Compare the attitudes of Abner and Joab in v. 26-27. Was Abner's reason for halting the fighting a Godly one, do you think? Explain your answer.
- 9. Make an outline of David's family at this point. How many wives does he have now? How many children?
- 10. Who was Abigail? (2 Samuel 3) Review 1 Samuel 25 and how Abigail became the wife of David.
- 11. Who anointed David king over Israel, ultimately, in 2 Samuel 5? How old was he when he became king over all Israel?

Discuss:

- 1. Review 1 Samuel 4-7: What sequence of events placed the ark where it is in chapter 6? (1 Sa 7:2)
- 2. Note what's going on all around, as the ark is loaded up to be returned? Who is present?
- 3. Who is Abinadab, and what was his relationship to Uzzah? (I Sa 7) What different, higher expectations did God have for Uzzah? Especially consider 1 Chronicles 13:5-6
- 4. Who was the last person(s) we've read about struck down and killed by God? (1 Sa 6:19) Compare that incident with Uzzah's fate: how should Uzzah's actions have been different?
- 5. Give a quick outline of how David proceeds with the ark of the Lord after Uzzah's end. Give examples from 2 Sa 6 and 1 Chr 13 where you observe a change in David's reverence toward the ark of the Lord.
- 6. Could Michal have had reason to despise David? How did her bitterness toward David cause her to, in turn, despise God?
- 7. In 1 Chronicles 14, how does David approach his position as king differently from Saul? Saul had Samuel.... who does David rely upon to communicate with God?
- 8. In the song, Days of Elijah, the lyrics state "... your servant David rebuilding a temple of praise". Based on what you read in 1 Chronicles 15-16, how accurately do the lyrics apply? What word change(s) could be applied to make the lyrics more accurate with the Biblical account?
- 9. What laws of Moses did David restore regarding the ark, as he brought it back to the city of David?
- 10. What city is this, referred to as the "city of David"? (1 Chr 15:1; 2 Sa 5:6-7, 1 Chr 11:7) What was its function before David moved in?
- 11. After reading these passages, what impression do you have of David's passion for the Lord and his ark? What actions stood out to you of David's that showed his love and honor toward God?

Week 78: David Plans a House for God

Read: 2 Samuel 7; 1 Chronicles 17, 22

Discuss:

- 1. Who is Nathan? Review: who is the last prophet of God who guided David, and what has happened since his death in 1 Samuel 28?
- 2. Describe the "political climate" as we begin this chapter: is David engaged in any wars or conflicts? Why is this important to his current mindset?
- 3. David here requests Nathan's counsel, a different approach than in previous weeks (2 Sa 5:19). What is different about his current request?
- 4. In verses 5-7, God asks several rhetorical questions of David. What are they? How is God instructing David?
- 5. Compare 2 Samuel 7:5-16 with 1 Chronicles 17:7-14. Are they different at all? What house does God say HE will establish? How is that house superior to one David wanted to build for God?
- 6. What other leaders prior to David have written songs of praise to God like this? Flnd a few examples in Exodus and Judges.
- 7. Examine this song of praise: what names are used for God? Look up "sovereign" in a dictionary: what character of God is David mentioning here?
- 8. In chapter 22, David reveals further information from God about the building of the temple: What did God tell David? (v. 6-10) How did David react to God's restriction?
- 9. Make a few lists of what all David prepared for the temple: what raw materials did he acquire? What types of skilled laborers did he ready for Solomon's use? How did he prepare the people to give aid to Solomon's project?
- 10. What Godly blessing does David mention in I Chr 22:12 that will be echoed by Solomon himself when he becomes king? (if you don't remember, keep this verse in mind for a few weeks!)
- 11. Discuss the manner in which David prepares the leaders of Israel to help Solomon. How has God prepared the way for the people to do this work for God? Have the children of Israel ever done work for God on this scale? When? How were the conditions similar to these? (Ex 25)

Discuss:

- 1. Discuss the "domino effect" we observe here in chapter 11: Where does David first go wrong? How did that sin give way to other sin?
- 2. Who are the Hittites? (1 Samuel 11:3) What do you observe about his character in 11:6-14? Contrast his commitment to the army of the Lord with what David is currently stationed.
- 3. What is a siege? Consider Joab's message back to David in 11:19-25, a reference to Judges 9:50-57... What's the danger in coming too close to the walls of a besieged city?
- 4. Did Joab obey David's orders? What history does Joab have with David- what do you remember from previous weeks about Joab? (2 Samuel 2, 10)
- 5. Consider Nathan's position: what other interactions has he had with David? What accusations is God, through Nathan, leveling against David? (12:9)
- 6. How TRULY secret was David's sin- how many other people knew of it, or helped David to carry it out? Why would secret sin be justly punished "before the sun"? (v. 12)
- 7. Look at David's words in Psalms 32 & 51, as well as 12:13: how does David respond to his realization of his sin against the Lord?
- 8. What insight does David show about life after death, in his attitude toward his deceased infant son? (12:23)
- 9. How does this account show the Lord's attitude toward Solomon, despite the sins of his parents?
- 10.Do a bit of research about the crown David took from the defeated king's head. How much did it weigh, in today's measurements?

- 5. Why do you think David acted so quickly when he has Solomon anointed king? What actions did they have Solomon make that would have confirmed his place on David's throne?
- 6. What are Solomon's first commands as king? Do you see this as a wise decision? Why or why not?
- 7. Who else stated they were "going the way of all of the earth"? Compare David's words to Solomon with another leader of Israel's admonition to the next leader. (Joshua 1)
- 8. What do you learn from these examples? Dissect the advice you read: what responsibility is being given to Solomon? What "guidebook"? What assurances? Of what importance is his attitude/ heart? Who is now under Solomon's protection/ care?
- 9. What do you remember about Shimei? How does David recommend Solomon deal with himand why do you think David passes on this responsibility to Solomon? (2:9)
- 10. How has the stronghold of Zion changed during the kingship of David? What is its new moniker (name)? How did David develop it into his capitol, and does it still exist today? Do a bit of research with your favorite Bible reference book: what spiritual meaning does Zion have to us as Christ followers?

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
- 1. On the back, there is a map of Paul's journey, with locations numbered. See if you can find what verse corresponds with each number on the map as you read/ review.
